Medina County Historical Society Wins Award for War Bond Building

The Cleveland Restoration Society and the America Institute of Architects Cleveland have joined together to recognize excellence in historic preservation throughout the region. Winning Award of Excellence: Preservation of a Community Building is the Medina County Historical Society and the Medina War Bond Building located on the grounds of the McDowell-Phillips House Museum at 205 South Prospect Street.



Built in 1942, it was used for the sale of war bonds during World War II. Between 1942 and 1945, the building generated over \$3 million in war bond sales, and was rewarded with a visit from the famous comedians, Abbott and Costello.

The restoration is a story of community partnerships and collaboration. Through donations of time, services, and funds, plus volunteer hours, the interior and exterior were moved to its current site and restored to it's award-winning appearance,. Congratulations to all who worked on this project and saved another piece of Medina's history.

Medina Third Graders Receive Trees For Arbor Day

On April 22, the Medina Shade Tree Commission, Parks Department, and Kiwanis Club of Medina bagged seedlings that will be given to all Medina City Schools 3rd graders for the Arbor Day celebration on April 25, 2025. Kiwanis holds fund raisers annually to pay for the trees. This year's tree is a Thornless Honey Locust. As in years past, the students are asked to plant the tree, care for it, and see it grow to maturi-



ty. This is a hearty tree. It should be planted where it will get lots of sun, and in a location that provides enough room for it to spread out. The tree can grow to over 80 ' in height and 50 ' in width, and live for 100 years. In the fall, the leaves turn yellow.
